This Valentine's Day why not cosy up with a copy of Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream? It's the original RomCom. A magical tale of lovers Hermia, Helen, Demetrius and Lysander and the impish fairy Puck who meddles in their tangled web of love with hilarious consequences.

One of the most popular of Shakespeare's plays, A Midsummer Night's Dream is studied by our Year 8 students, serving as an introduction to England's most famous and influential writer, William Shakespeare, whose timeless works are still regularly performed and studied more than 400 years after his death.

THE BLURB: Shakespeare's a Midsummer Night's Dream is a play of enchantment and an insightful portrait of the predicaments of love.

When four young lovers flee from Athens and become lost in an enchanted wood, they stumble into a fairy world where King Oberon and Queen Titania, are feuding over ownership of a young Indian prince. Seeking his revenge on Titania, Oberon and his servant Puck begin a magical, yet farcical chain of events where all become interwoven in a comedic and mischievous play about the difficulties of love.
