Dear Parents, Carers and Students,

This newsletter celebrates a range of fantastic opportunities embraced by Park students over the past month. As you know, at Park we believe passionately that school is about finding what you love. We know, if we can find things we love, we are more likely to work hard, be resilient and feel confident to do our best. These qualities help us pursue our passions in life and make us more willing to push ourselves outside of our comfort zone.

Therefore, meaningful learning experiences both in the classroom and beyond are vital. I think you'll agree that this newsletter celebrates great examples of both. The theme of global citizenship has run through this half term. Mr Cavanagh's assembly a few weeks ago celebrated the diversity we have at Park. He highlighted the 28 different languages spoken by students and staff in our school and the wonderful diversity it brings to our whole community.

In 2025 so far, we have welcomed 31 students from China, 20 Year 9 students and 6 staff have travelled to India, 50 Year 10 students have explored Paris, and we have further international trips to New York and Poland planned for later in the year. Each of these experiences broaden the perspectives of those lucky enough to travel but also bring back fantastic stories and cultural moments to share with the whole school.

Travel, be it more locally or further afield, especially when we can do it together, creates lifelong bonds and memories. Years 7,8 and 9 have all brought letters home about end of year trips to London and Stone Henge. We have heavily discounted the cost so that all students are able to attend.

Of course, none of the in-school or trip experiences are possible if students don't attend school. Our school attendance is improving and our themed attendance streaks have created an excitement at morning line ups. Attendance this year is up 3% on last year. This means more students are making good progress at school, feel happy and are more likely to pass their GCSEs. Thank you for your support with this.

We look forward to seeing all students back in school on Monday 24 February and hope you have a great half term.

Park in Paris

We had a great time in France last week with 50 of our Year 10 students enjoying time in the Disneyland Paris parks, some being very brave and trying big rides and French food for the first time! Students also enjoyed meeting their favourite Disney characters around the parks and watching the parade.

On Thursday, we gave students the opportunity to go into Paris to take a long walk and see the most famous landmarks in Paris. Despite the cold and the long 5-mile walk, 39 students chose to come along, and they were great ambassadors of Park Community School in the train, the underground and in Paris. We were able to spend some time outside the Louvres Museum to see the Pyramid before walking through Les Tuileries gardens and past Place de la Concorde before enjoying free time shopping on the Champs Élysées. After meeting at the Arc de Triomphe, we walked to the Eiffel Tower and on the Place du Trocadero before getting the metro and the train back.

On Friday, we stopped to visit the Thiepval WWI memorial and to try and find our ancestors on the walls of the memorial building amongst the thousand names of British soldiers killed on French soil during the First World War. Students showed great respect and were a credit to Park and great ambassadors for the UK.

London Geography Trip

Year 10 Geographers had an opportunity to visit London and explore our global city case study first hand. We travelled up by train, which we identified as the first feature of a global city – having great transport networks, we also noted and saw planes landing in London City Airport which is 1 of 6 of London's airports!

Once arriving in London, we walked across to the embankment, noting the number of services available especially for tourist like us.

All students were very excited to get on the London Eye to get a better view of London, although some had a few wobbly knees when we saw up close how high we were going to be.

The view across London on the Eye enabled us to see many other features of our global city, from Canary Wharf our financial centre to China town, an area showing diversity and culture. We even managed to locate two contrasting areas of London we have been discussing in class of Kensington and Newham.

After the excitement of the Eye, we were all feeling a bit hungry so ventured off to find food, via Trafalgar Square. We were lucky enough to see our British Farmers protesting with their very noisy tractors all around Parliament and Westminster, yet another feature of a global city!

Reservoir Ambassadors

Our Reservoir Ambassadors attended their first meeting as part of this group along with representatives from 9 local schools. The groups' focus is on learning about the processes for the development of the reservoir, considering the positives for community and educational and of course challenging potential negatives.

During the first meeting, students were introduced to one another and each shared the reason why they wanted to become a Reservoir Ambassador (which Park students articulated excellently). They were also given PPE to wear and mock job roles to discuss and learn about.

The students were then given time to share what they already knew about the reservoir before being informed of new information, interesting facts, and new developments. Our Park students - Dakota, Liam, and Ryan - shared some knowledge about the need for sustainable water supply and the future ecological benefits of the site.

Students were then invited up to the viewing platform, where they discussed the current site and asked many enthusiastic questions to one of the site engineers. Lastly, students went on site to view some of the machinery and talk about the different aspects or the project that are currently underway.

It was a great experience and all students seemed to really enjoy themselves.


























Saturday 8th February - Threads of togetherness
