Best Ever Exam Results

Park Community School is proud to announce our best ever results - 5A*-C GCSEs or equivalent with English and Maths 55% and 5A*-C GCSEs or equivalent 95%. These results show that our students make progress at a rate which means they leave with grades that no other school in this area can match. The 'Gold Standard' figure of 55% is over twice what Park students would achieve at a good school.

We are pleased to announce that, following an overwhelming vote, our new community building is to be known as the 'Dickinson Centre' as a tribute to Sean Dickinson, Headteacher of Park Community School from 1997 to 2008. It was Sean's vision that our school should be at the heart of the community, with facilities that could be shared by all community members.



Initially the Dickinson Centre will be open from 9 am to 5 pm Monday to Friday, but we expect to extend those hours. If you are passing by, do pop in and have a look around.

Our new school moves a step closer

Park Community School is Hampshire County Council's highest priority for replacement because of the building's condition. About 70% of the existing building is constructed from a 1950s pre-cast concrete system which is very close to the end of its useful life. $\pounds 20$ million has been identified within the County Council's capital programme to replace the defective buildings and refurbish the remainder of the school. The anticipated date for work to start on site is summer 2012. Two of the existing buildings, that are unaffected by structural problems, will be kept but refurbished so that they are significantly updated and fit in with the overall look of the new school.

Double thanks!

Thank you to students and staff who made contributions towards the East Africa Food Crisis Appeal on non-uniform day in July. Together we raised nearly £800.

Thanks also to students and their parents who raised £156.78 for the Motor Neurone Disease Association at our awards evenings in July.

The addition of this latest sum means that, since 2008, we have raised \pounds 2,455 for this charity with which we have such meaningful ties.

The rebuilding/refurbishment will require a complex programme of demolition and construction. This will be done in different phases so that Park remains fully operational as an 'Outstanding' school. The process of designing the school has been taking place for the past year or so to ensure that it will continue to thrive as a centre of educational innovation and excellence; a dynamic and exciting place for the whole community.

We anticipate that a planning application will be made in early October. A community open evening will be held in September at Park Community School where preliminary proposals will be on display.



Year 10 trip to Sorrento
