RACE AT OUR PLACE!

Our annual 'Race at our Place' is in its 6th year. As a school and a community it is a very proud day for everyone. Around 1000 students and staff took to the streets to either walk, jog, run or help marshall the race from Park Community School to Leigh Park Gardens and back again in a wave of pink t-shirts. The race is in support of anyone that has been affected by cancer and to raise money to help find a cure.

It is a very emotional day for many staff and students who have lost loved ones or been affected by cancer and the public support along the race route makes it all the more special.



SCIENCE WEEK!

The theme of this year's Science Week was 'Journeys'. What better journey could there be than to travel to another planet to investigate live and explore? Years 7 and 8 were tasked with just that – what would they need to do to survive on the Martian planet? Students researched Mars: the soil, temperature, landscape and the fact that there is less gravity on Mars than on Earth. What would that mean for building and living in a very different environment?

Both year groups approached the project with enthusiasm and creativity. In class we watched the Mars Rover explore the surface

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of the planet so students were able to see where they could build their new living spaces. Students overcame obstacles such as how to get oxygen, grow plants, keep animals and entertain people on an uninhabited planet. As pioneers they designed and built a range of brilliant, interesting structures perfect for inhabiting the Red Planet.



Some students tackled the problem of travelling to Mars, looking at weightlessness and how to perform simple tasks like cutting nails, sleeping and going to the toilet in space!

Overall, both year groups did a fantastic job and had fun thinking about, designing and building a new civilisation in space.







Hampshire & Isle of Wight Air Ambulance experience

Students had the opportunity to work with the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance and to really understand what their job entails.

They began with planning their journey as they would before any call out, this meant reading maps and calculating bearings.

The students then had to arrange and sort out their kit bag to ensure they have everything to hand. This usually takes two minutes for the professionals, it took our students slightly longer! They also had to measure out the right amount of medication required to sedate the patient.

Once this activity was completed, volunteers were chosen to role play as a paramedic on the Air Ambulance. They were allowed to wear the uniform and looked very smart. They commented on how heavy the bags were!

They then had to assess the situation and 'scoop' the patient onto the board, strapping them in using spider straps! The whole group lifted the patient to be wrapped in bubble wrap to keep them warm!

It really was an amazing session and the students gaining vital experience of how important the Air Ambulance are and how crucial their services are to saving lives.








GCSEs are coming!

Students have been working extremely hard and know a range of revision strategies they can use to support them with their learning. The revision they do between now and the exams will make a huge difference.



What can I do to help?

- Revision classes: Over Easter, there are a range of Revision classes running. Please encourage
 your child to attend. All parents have been texted a link to the timetable and students have
 been emailed.
- Revision timetable: Make sure your child has created a revision timetable. You can download a proforma from our website in the Revision and Homework section.
- Test them: Encourage your child to plan their revision for each subject and help them
 remember once they've completed each session. The more we practise remembering, the
 more the information sticks.
- Take breaks: Make sure your child takes regular breaks and gets outside during the Easter break too. Regular snacks to keep energy levels up are also important.
- Encourage them to use GCSEpod. They all have logins for this and many teachers will have sent them personalised playlists. Links are on our website, in the students


shared area and can be found on the page opposite.

Although each Spanish region, and even city and village, has its own particular customs and practices during this time of year, Semana Santa celebrations are nowhere else more elaborate and spectacular as they are in Andalusia, the sunny south of the country.



Here, the most important Catholic holiday is commemorated with a week full of colour, art, religious fervour and extravagant processions. The most spectacular events take place in Malaga and Seville, where the streets are taken over by flamboyant parades and intricate religious displays depicting biblical scenes. Like everywhere in Spain, the festivities begin on Palm Sunday (Domingo de Ramos) and last until Easter Monday (Lunes de Pascua), with the most dramatic and passionate parades held on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. In Malaga, Semana Santa is celebrated with various religious and military parades accompanied by music, inviting incense and floral scents, as well as lots of colour and cheer.

An excerpt from our final report reads as follows:

"The overall strength of Park is that it is ahead of its time in that it addresses the issues that schools often face when some, often many, members of the community it serves feel alienated from education and opportunity. Park meets this head on with its determination to meet its vision, 'Success for All through Attainment, Resilience and Autonomy', by developing its students through a strong partnership with parents, by taking the school out into the community, and bringing the community into the school.

The school provides a curriculum which, as described by a parent at verification," Meets the real needs of the students". Parents said that "As a parent your voice is heard". This was clear in conversation with the staff who summed it up succinctly, "We are all in this together". The students who contributed to the verification were articulate, clear about how the school works with their parents, and proud to be 'Ambassadors' for Park. As usual we conducted our annual parents' survey during Student Review Day on 14th February. Many thanks to everyone who took the time to respond. As last year, nearly 200 of you gave your feedback on what we were doing well and what we need to continue to improve.

4 out of 5 agreed that:

- 'I receive valuable information about my child's progress.'
- 'The school provided good support to help my child settle into life at Park.'
- 'The school is well led and managed.'
- 'The school is good at encouraging students to support the wider community as active, helpful citizens.'
- 'The school provides a wide range of trips and extra-curricular activities.'
- 'The school responds well to any concerns I raise.'
- 'The school's values and attitudes have a positive effect on my child(ren)'
- 'My child is happy at Park.'
- 'My child is making good progress at Park.'
- 'My child is well looked after at Park.'
- 'I would recommend this school to another parent.'

Comments on the best things about Park included:

- 'I appreciate the wide range of opportunities on offer.'
- 'The school is clearly dedicated to bringing out the best in the children.'
- 'There are a lot of brilliant teachers, as well as good food and great facilities.'

There were very few suggestions for improvement, they included:

 'Refining the organisation of behaviour sanctions.' We addressed this by introducing a simplified approach last half term. The details were explained in a letter to parents from Mrs Capaldi in February.

Another suggestion related to monitoring homework. We agree that homework is vitally important to each student's success, especially in the new, more challenging GCSEs. We have reminded staff of the importance of logging homework on MILK. We are also planning improvements to the students' section of the school's intranet site so that it includes more support materials for both homework and revision. Your own interest and involvement in your child's homework really makes all the difference.

Remember, our surveys are anonymous. If you make a comment about a very specific concern we won't know who to get back to. If you have any individual concerns remember that the first person to contact is the class teacher or group mentor. If necessary, the next person to contact would be your child's Head of Year or Welfare, Support & Guidance Manager.


London Photography Trip

When I had attended these meals, I had interviewed people and they said 'during half term the cupboards can get quite bare but thanks to MUNCH, our cupboards not as empty.'*

Across the school this year we have been reinforcing the fact that reading is a key skill for life and that there is a book out there for everyone to enjoy, you just have to find the right one!

Thursday 7 March 2019 was this year's World Book Day and this year we decided to extend the celebrations into a whole week of activities to promote reading for pleasure to our students. For Park's reading week, the restaurant was transformed into a spectacular scene with book cover bunting, book steps and a reading corner for our first ever 'Read-aloud-athon'. Our mission was to have someone reading aloud for the whole week during school hours in the restaurant. The 'Read-aloud-athon' was a huge success with over 50 members of staff and a range of students reading aloud for over 29 hours during the week. It was fantastic to see the wide range of texts and audiences for this event as well as some reading in French and Spanish during languages lessons.

On Wednesday, we set up a pop-up book shop in the restaurant where every student in the school was given a free book to enjoy. Alongside this, we had a book giveaway where students were able to select as many books as they wanted from a wide selection. It was amazing to see so many students leaving school with new books to enjoy.

Students were also able to share their reading skills with wider audiences with some Year 8 students reading to the Nursery children each day and some Year 7 students going to read to elderly members of the community in local residential homes. In both cases our students were incredible, adapting their reading style to suit the needs of their listener and taking time to get to know them too!







Another highlight of the week was the 'shelfie' competition where mentoring groups had to look at a range of photographs of bookshelves and guess which member of staff they belonged to. Students and staff became fiercely competitive and used their problem-solving skills to guess the correct answer.

Overall, it was a brilliant week with staff and students remembering the importance of reading but also celebrating the enjoyment that reading for pleasure brings.

During reading week:

- 10 students read to nursery children for a total of 1.5 hours
- 15 students went out to local elderly residents' homes to read
- 27 staff 'shelfies' were shared
- Hundreds of books were taken from our book stall in the restaurant
- Over 900 world book day books were given to students
- 55 members of staff read aloud for 29 hours in our 'Read-aloud-athon'

Sports Ambassadors attended the Step into Sport Inclusive Leadership day along with eight other secondary schools. Students were fortunate enough to work with Toby Gabrett, Olympic Gold Medal triathlete. Our students learnt a variety of leadership skills with Portsmouth University and Chichester University.



SWAP Health & Wellbeing Programme

I am Harrison, an ex-student from Park and now a Wellbeing Adviser at Nuffield Health in Portsmouth. We have been running a school wellbeing activity programme with students from Year 7. The programme has been arranged to help school children have a better understanding of wellbeing as well as looking at the effects of poor diet and lifestyle choices. The SWAP project breaks down into four topics....

- How I move focusing on physical activity.
- How I eat focusing on sugar content, hydration, fruit and vegetables.
- How I sleep focusing on sleep, sleep hygiene and screen time.
- -How I feel focusing on emotional wellbeing.

We are over half way through the programme and the students have made simple changes to their wellbeing such as swapping sugary snacks for healthier options, trying to drink eight cups of water a day and becoming more active.

It has been a pleasure working with the students who have put 100% into the class workshops and the exercise classes to get the most out of SWAP and I hope they pass their knowledge onto friends and their families.


in a 6-0 final score and were put through into the semi finals!

Are you eligible to claim free school meals for your child?

Eligibility for free school meals depends on the circumstances of the parents or carers. A child is eligible for free school meals if their parent or carer receives one or more of the following benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seekers' Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided you are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit, and have an annual gross income, of no more than £16,190 as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs (Parents who are made redundant or start working less that 16 hours per week, may find their children are entitled to free meals for a limited period)

- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)

It's really important that if your child is eligible for free school meals you should claim, as our school receives additional funding, the Pupil Premium, for every pupil registered with the council. This funding makes a significant difference and is used to help raise pupil achievement and provide a broad curriculum and opportunities for our pupils.

Checking your child's eligibility for free school meals is quick and simple using the online checking facility https://www.cloudforedu.org.uk/ofsm/hants
You will need the following information:

- Your own name, date of birth, and contact details
- National Insurance number or National Asylum Seekers number
- Child's name and date of birth
- School your child is attending or will attend

LACA School Chef of the Year 2019



Recipe from Award Winning Chef - Steven Cross Steamed Teriyaki Salmon with Spicy Greens



Why not try our great cholesterol busting tasty recipe that will help you feel vitalised and fresh after the likely over-indulgence of Easter?

This recipe has great zingy Asian flavours and is high in iron, protein, omega 3 and vitamin B12.

This dish is really healthy and is tasty as lunch or dinner.

Ingredients

- Salmon Fillet (Skinless)
- 2tsp Honey
- 3tsp Dark Soy Sauce
- 3tsp Sesame Oil
- 1tsp Sesame Seeds
- 2 Garlic Cloves
- 1 Stick Ginger
- 1 Small White Onion
- 2 Red Chillies
- Curly Kale
- Tender Stem Broccoli
- Pak Choi

Method

Make the marinade for your salmon by mixing honey, soy sauce, 1tsp sesame oil, 1 finely sliced garlic clove and 1tsp finely cut ginger. Add to the salmon fillet, leave in the fridge to marinate for 4-8 hours.

Prepare your vegetables by slicing the pak choi, cutting the broccoli into four and removing any woody stalks from the kale. Set vegetables aside.

Pre-heat the oven to 160 degrees, ready to cook the salmon.

Cut a 30cm square piece of baking parchment and make a bag by folding in half and folding the edges.

Add the salmon to the bag with the remaining marinade and sesame seeds. Fold the bag, close and place on a tray.

Cook the salmon for 15-20 minutes in your pre-heated oven.

While the salmon is cooking, heat a wok or heavy frying pan, add the remaining sesame oil and allow to smoke slightly. Add the white onion, finely sliced remaining garlic clove and ginger, and cook for 2 minutes. Finally add the kale and sliced pak choi and cook until tender.

Serve the green vegetables in a bowl, remove the salmon from the oven and place on top of the greens and pour over the remaining liquid from the bag.

Finish with some freshly chopped coriander and more sesame seeds.
